

PERMIT STATUS BY YEAR 2006 - CURRENT




- Kentucky currently has 1,269 bonded permits.
 - 83 actively producing permits;30% increase from July 2020.
 - 125 suspended permits; 95% increase from July 2020.

- DMRE personnel within the coal program conducted 15,785 inspections during Fiscal Year 2023.
- Maintained inspection frequency of nearly 100%.
- DMRE has 56 inspection staff as of July 2023.
 - Observing increased turnover rate as a result of other agencies staffing up.




- In FY2023, DMRE issued:
 - 656 Notices of Non-Compliance (NNCs) citing 1,023 performance standards.
 - 7% increase from 2022.
 - **318 COs**
 - 8% decrease from 2022.
 - The 318 COs is comprised of 305 FTACOs and 13 IDCOs.
- Most common performance standards in FY2023 are:
 - Water Monitoring
 - Sediment Ponds
 - Water Quality


 DMRE is closely monitoring outstanding violations across the State and working to improve abatement rates.



 Outstanding violations increased amongst solvent entities when comparing 2022 to 2023.

- DMRE staff continue to closely monitor highwall and highwall reclamation efforts.
 - Tracking both active and idled operations.
 - Since 2019, total highwall across the State has been reduced by more than 13 percent.
 - Currently, approximately 50% of the highwall in the State is under violation for time and/or distance.

COAL PROGRAM: THREE-YEAR NON-DISTURBED PERMITS

- DMRE has been verifying 3-year non-disturbed permits in accordance with Directive 26 and 405 KAR 8:010 Section 17(2).
 - A permit **terminates three (3) years from issuance** if mining-related disturbance is not initiated.
 - An extension must be requested from DMRE through the Director's office prior to the expiration of the 3year term to avoid termination of the permit.
 - It is the permittee's responsibility to request this extension.
 - Justification for the extension in accordance with 405 KAR 8:010 Section 17(2)(b)(1-2).



COAL PROGRAM: SECTION 401 AND 404 PERMIT APPROVALS

- Section 401 and 404 approval <u>must</u> be obtained prior to disturbance of jurisdictional waters.
- Inspection staff will be closely monitoring disturbance and verifying if permits have been obtained.
- Failure to obtain the required permits will result in enforcement action.

COAL PROGRAM: CITIZEN'S REQUEST FOR INSPECTION

- In FY2023, DMRE received 448 CRIs
 - This is a more than 107% increase from FY2022.
 - Increase largely attributed to the July 2022 catastrophic flood event.
- DMRE is also observing more instances of fugitive gas in water wells and subsidence complaints.
- Majority of subsidence investigations will now be surveyed.
 - This will allow for increased certainty in determinations.

COAL PROGRAM: VERIFYING SUBWATERSHEDS ON AREA MINES

- DMRE is closely evaluating subwatersheds on area mining operations utilizing LiDAR imagery, drone imagery, field walks, and GIS mapping.
- Subwatersheds must adhere to the approved design in the permit package.
- Deviations will result in enforcement actions.




Photo: Subwatershed analysis comparing permitted drainages to as-built drainages.

NON-COAL PROGRAM: OVERVIEW

- As of FY2023:
 - 237 non-coal permits in Kentucky
 - Over 42,000 total permitted acres.
 - Nearly 1,000 inspections conducted.
- Now five (5) inspectors (previously only 4 in Noncoal).

NON-COAL PROGRAM: IMCC 2023 RECLAMATION AWARD WINNER

- The Interstate Mining Compact Commission (IMCC) awarded a national reclamation award to a Kentucky non-coal permit in 2023—second year in a row.
 - Sim Mine; Kentucky-Tennessee
 Clay Company; Permit No. 020-950 I
- DMRE hopes to continue encouraging exemplary reclamation of non-coal sites.
