The following presentation is intended to discuss and introduce sections of Kentucky Statutes and Regulations regarding the practice of Engineering and Land Surveying in Kentucky. The material presented has been compressed and summarized for presentation during the time period allotted and can be referred to in locating the specific sections of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) and the Kentucky Administrative Regulations (KAR). The full wording and intent published in the KRS and KAR should be read and investigated prior to reaching any interpretation and/or conclusion regarding any individual or corporate issue.

Who am I to tell you about Ethics?

We are experiencing a dangerous time in our country with a political environment where basic facts are disputed, fundamental truth is questioned, lying is normalized, and unethical behavior is ignored, excused, or rewarded...

Although I am no expert, I have studied, read, and thought about ethical leadership [ETHICS]...and struggled for decades with how to practice it. What does *Ethics* mean?

- More than 2300 years Plato and Aristotle identified Ethics to be the attributes of honor, honesty, friendship and courage in developing knowledge in a practical craft or industry.
- Since the 1500's Engineering has developed into many branches with rules to determine if an action is right or wrong.
- *Ethics* are rules that were adopted to perform tasks the right way.
- Ethical s have nothing to do with individual rights or beliefs.
- Governments combine these rules into an <u>Ethical Code</u> to assure competency, honesty, and fairness in providing services in an industry.

Why do we need a Code of Ethics?

- History and persistent errors in practice has demonstrated that members of any trade group or organization need rules to stay out of trouble and act in a way that brings credit to the group.
- Questions of right or wrong regarding technology, procedures, reliance on computer programs, and legal interpretations require decisions in the practice of Engineering and Land Surveying.
- A Code of Professional Practice and Conduct, an "Ethical Code", is needed to guide the professional in such decisions.

Who Established the Code of Ethics for Engineers?

- The United States Constitution gives the power to individual states for the regulation and control of the professions of engineers and land surveyors. The State legislation in turn charge state professional licensing boards with the responsibility of regulating the practice of Engineering and land surveying to promote the welfare of the public in safeguarding life, liberty, and property. (NCEES, 2004).
- The Kentucky State Board of Licensure for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors (KYBLPS) was established by an Act of the Kentucky General Assembly in 1938,
- KBPLS protects public health, safety and welfare through the licensing and regulation of individuals and firms to practice Engineering and Land Surveying.

What is the authority of the Kentucky State Board?

The Board was given authority by the Legislature to promulgate a Code of Professional Practice and Conduct under KRS 322. The Code is intended to

- Regulate *professional conduct* of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors.
- Establish and maintain a high standard of *integrity, skills, and practice* in the professions of engineering and land surveying.
- Be binding upon every person holding a certification of registration as a Professional Engineer or Land Surveyor.
- Vest the Board with *police powers to establish and maintain conduct, policy,* and practice.

Kentucky Revised Statues Chapter 322 Engineers and Surveyors

Since 1938, KRS 322 has been revised and amended with the repeal of some statues and the passage of others. Currently there are 52 Statues in KRS 322. Three that are of primary interest in this presentation are:

KRS322:020 - Practice of Engineering or Land Surveying without License Prohibited

KRS322:060 - Prerequisites for Practice of Engineering by a Business Entity -- Permit --Responsibility for Conduct -- Disciplinary Action --

KRS322:180 - Grounds for Denial of License and for Disciplinary Action

KRS 322.180

Grounds for Denial of Licensure and for Disciplinary Action

- 1. Engaged in any **practice of fraud or deceit** in obtaining a license
- 2. Engaged in **gross negligence**, **incompetence**, **or misconduct** in the practice of engineering or land surveying;
- 3. Violated any provision of this chapter, [including] the administrative regulations promulgated by the board, or the code of professional practice and conduct in the administrative regulations;
- 4. Employed, procured, or induced a person not licensed to practice engineering or land surveying in this state;
- 5. Aided or abetted a person not licensed to practice engineering or land surveying in this state;
- 6. Been granted a license upon a mistake of material fact;
- 7. Been convicted by a court of law of a felony, if in accordance with KRS Chapter 335B;
- 8. Become **a chronic or persistent alcoholic or has become drug-addicted** so that continued practice is dangerous to clients or to the public safety;
- **9.** Developed a physical or mental disability or other condition so that continued practice is dangerous to clients or to the public safety;
- 10. Violated any order of suspension or the terms or conditions of **any order of probation** issued by the Board;

KRS 322.180

Grounds for Denial of Licensure and for Disciplinary Action

- 11. Had a license or registration certificate to practice as an engineer or land surveyor **denied**, **limited**, **suspended**, **probated**, **or revoked** in another jurisdiction...;
- 12. Engaged in conduct likely to deceive or defraud the public;
- 13. Presented or attempted to use... the license, seal, or stamp of another (engineer);
- 14. Falsely impersonated any other licensee;
- 15. Attempted to use an expired, suspended, or revoked license;
- 16. Provided certification for any plan, specification, plat, report, or physical description **not prepared by him or her or under his or her direct supervision**; or\
- 17. Applied the certification (seal, stamp, signature, or title block) of another professional engineer to any work that was not prepared by that individual.

201 KAR 18:142 Code of Professional Practice & Conduct

2	The engineer or land surveyor shall conduct his or her practice in order to protect the public health, safety,
	<u>and welfare</u> .
3	A licensee shall issue all professional communications and work products in an objective and truthful
	<u>manner.</u>
4	A licensee shall avoid conflicts of interest and shall act objectively and independently.
5	A licensee shall solicit or accept work only on the basis of his or her, or the licensee's firm's or associates'
	<u>gualifications</u> for the work offered.
6	A licensee shall <i>not knowingly associate with any person engaging in fraudulent, illegal, or dishonest</i>
	<u>activities</u> .
7	A licensee shall perform his or her services only in the areas of his or her competence.
8	A <i>licensee shall not certify any work product</i> in which he or she lacks competence by virtue of education

How Many Engineers are Licensed in KY?

There are currently **17,883** individuals licensed by the KYBLPS to practice,

Approximately 1,000 individuals are licensed Land Surveyors

The licensed Professional Engineers do not live in Kentucky.

Kentucky does not license by engineering discipline, so the exact number of Professional Engineers licensed to practice Mining Engineering in Kentucky is unknown.

In the period June 2021 to May 2022:

• only one individual with a mining degree received an initial PE license, and

•three endorsement applications for licensure were received from individuals with mining degrees and passed the NCEES mining engineering examination.

Facts regarding Continuing Education in Kentucky

Kentucky requires submittal of 30 hours of Continuing Education (Professional Development Hours) every two calendar years.

If a Notice of Audit is received :

- You must respond within 30 days from the date of the Notice.
- You must submit a log with documents verifying your attendance and/or completion of claimed hours.
- Failure to do so may result in disciplinary action.

If some of your **pdh hours are disallowed**:

- You will be granted up to 180 days to either substantiate your original claim or earn other PDH units.
- This applies only to PDH units submitted but disallowed. PDH's submitted is a violation

Facts regarding Other Issues in Kentucky

Documents with an electronic signature in place of an original seal, signature and date can be electronically transmitted provided the electronic signature:

- 1) is a unique identification of the licensee;
- 2) is verifiable;
- 3) is under the licensee's direct and exclusive control;

The certification of a Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasure (SPCC) Plan in Kentucky is considered the practice of engineering and therefore requires a PE licensed.
