

COAL PROGRAM: INSPECTION ACTIVITY

- Kentucky has 1,337 permits as of July 2021.
 - 66 permits in AP status (actively producing).
- 29 permits are in RV (revoked) status.
 - This is in response to the recent Revelation/Blackjewel bankruptcy proceedings.




COAL PROGRAM: INSPECTION ACTIVITY

- DMRE personnel within the coal program conducted 16,672 inspections during Fiscal Year 2021.
 - 10,899 partial inspections
 - 5,773 complete inspections
- Inspection frequency remained high at 99%.
 - As with last year, precautions were taken so that inspections continued throughout COVID closures.
- DMRE has 55 inspection staff as of July 2021.





- In FY2021, DMRE issued:
 - 1,190 violations
 - 529 Cessation Orders.
 - This is a decrease from FY2020 (1,820 violations and 1,134 Cessation Orders were issued).
- Most common performance standards are:
 - Water Monitoring
 - Other Permit Conditions
 - Sediment Ponds






- DMRE staff spent approximately 10,000 hours in work related to bankruptcies over the past year.
 - Bankruptcy hearing preparation and participation
 - Conducting reclamation cost estimates
 - Preparing enforcement updates
 - Meeting with industry representatives and legal staff






COAL PROGRAM: EXTENSIONS BEYOND 90 DAYS

- If the remedial measures of a non-compliance have **not** been performed and the non-compliance has **not** been abated within the required timeframe, then an extension may be requested.
- 405 KAR 12:020 Section 2 Subsection 2 (b) (1-4) identifies the following reasons or conditions in which a noncompliance may be extended beyond ninety (90) days:
 - Awaiting approval of a permitting action
 - Pending valid judicial order
 - Labor strike
 - Unfavorable climatic conditions (weather)




COAL PROGRAM: BOND RELEASE



- DMRE recommends that permittees continue seeking bond release at the soonest opportunity available.
- FY2021 saw an increase in released acres in comparison to previous years.


COAL PROGRAM: BOND FORFEITURE

- In FY2021, DMRE finalized six
 (6) bond forfeitures.
- Numbers are expected to increase in upcoming years.
- DMRE is working to avoid forfeitures when possible:
 - Surety Reclamation Agreements
 - Permit transfers




COAL PROGRAM: CITIZEN'S REQUEST FOR INSPECTION

- DMRE continues to observe an increase in the complexity of CRI complaints and investigations.
- Primary violations issued as the result of CRIs include:
 - Water quality
 - Hydrologic requirements (seeps)
 - Backfilling and grading


NON-COAL PROGRAM: PERMIT REVIEW AND ENFORCEMENT

- The Non-Coal Review Section of the Division of Mine Reclamation and Enforcement (DMRE) permits, regulates and enforces the surface mining reclamation laws and regulations for non-coal mining sites in the State.
- Non-coal mining includes:
 - Limestone, dolomite, sand, gravel, clay, fluorspar, tar sands or rock asphalt, shale, surface effects of dredging river sand and gravel, and other vein minerals.



NON-COAL PROGRAM: PERMIT REVIEW AND ENFORCEMENT

- As of FY2021:
 - 243 non-coal permits in Kentucky; 53 pending applications
 - 40,398 total permitted acres
 - 1,550 inspections conducted
 - 6 violations issued
 - 19 citizen complaints investigated

Distribution of Non-Coal Permits Across Kentucky




EXPLOSIVES AND BLASTING PROGRAM



- Responsible for the inspection and enforcement of the use of explosives in Kentucky.
- This includes the following:
 - Building demolition
 - Mining
 - Road construction
- As of June 2021, the Blasting Program had investigated <u>35 blasting complaints</u>.
- Forty-one (41) blasting trainings have been held to date.
- Permit-to-purchase or Receive explosives:
 - Coal: 47
 - Non-coal: 114
