- Fluid funding amounts based on historic mining and current mining
- \$9,000,000.00 current annual funding average
- Abatement of Historic Mining Hazards

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)

- Part of the IIJA federal law
- \$74,252,680.00 per year for 15 years
- Abatement of Historic Mining Hazards

AMLER Grants

- Annually voted upon by Congress, from general funds
- Distributed in grants to applicants selected by the Cabinet Secretary
- Appalachian Counties only
- \$25,000,000.00 average award to distribute for grants
- Community Economic Revitalization and Reclamation




An example of an AML installed Concrete Retaining Wall. Note the residential seeding in the yard area.






An example of an AML installed Type II Non-reinforced Concrete Block Wall with backfill.





An example of an AML installed Drainage Culvert with Dense Grade Aggregate backfill.


