### Mission Statement








### Assistance Provided

- Making state teams available to all companies
- ♦ Availability of Federally Mandated contest across the state to insure companies ability to maintain compliance.
- ♦ Allowing large mines to be maintained through furloughs by the providing of 2 teams.
- ♦ There are currently 15 Mine Rescue Teams within the state of Kentucky
  - the Division of Mine Safety employees make up 7 of the 15 teams

### 2020 Fatal Accidents

#### Fatality No.1

October 9, 2020, a 48 year old surface miner was fatally injured while working at a mine in the Harlan Branch.


The victim was changing the nozzle of a hydro-seeder's discharge gun, when he was struck by a release of energy.



#### Fatality No.2

October 13, 2020, a 58 year old underground miner was fatally injured while working at a mine in the Madisonville Branch.

The accident occurred when a battery powered scoop struck the shuttle car operator (victim) while tramming through a ventilation curtain.


#### Underground/Risk by Occupation:


