Selected current Initiatives inside EEC

- Evaluating Cabinet organizational needs/changes
- Implementing 9% general fund budget reduction (\$6.34M) for Fiscal Years 2017 and 2018
- Gov. Bevin's "Red Tape Reduction Initiative"
 - EEC is strategically evaluating and reviewing the approximately 850 regulations under the Cabinet's jurisdiction (~19% of the total number of Executive Branch regulations)
- Identifying potential legislative needs/proposals for 2017 legislative session
- Oil & Gas TENORM workgroup
- **Drinking Water** workgroup to protect against **lead** contamination
- Responding to new and proposed **federal regulatory actions**

Clean Air Act

CAA 111(d) – Clean Power Plan (CPP) requirements for GHGs

 Feb. 9, 2016, US Supreme Court ordered a stay, KY is on hold with work until the D.C Circuit makes a final ruling, to be heard by full court on September 27, 2016, Late 2016/early 2017 for decision.

• Startup, Shutdown, Malfunctions (SSM)

 39 states affected on how to deal with excess emissions during SSM events, final SIP due Nov. 22, 2016

• Ozone – 2015 standard of 70 ppb

 In compliance with ozone standard except for one monitor in N.KY and monitors in Louisville (June 2016)


• SO2 and MATS

- EPA issued "finding of failure" to submit SIP on Feb. 23, 2016, even though KY is in compliance with the SO2 standard and submitted timely clean data and redesignation requests
- All affected EGU's are moving toward MATS compliance






KY SO2 Emissions from EGU's 2000-2015






KY CO2 Emissions from EGU's 2000-2015



Waste Management Issues







DWM Regulatory Initiatives

- Coal Combustion Residuals (CCR):
 - On December 19, 2014, the EPA Administrator signed the final CCR rule. The rule establishes nationally applicable Subtitle D minimum criteria for the safe disposal of CCR in landfills and surface impoundments.
 - KY is working to incorporate rules in new Special Waste regulations to be proposed in 2016, finalized in 2017.
- Hazardous Waste:
 - Kentucky is updating all of its Hazardous Waste regulations to conform with the federal regulations to streamline to one set of requirements, including adoption of more flexible requirements.
 - Goal is to have proposed regulations finalized in CY2017.





TENORM

- EEC initiated diverse workgroup on March 11, 2016 to further address Oil & Gas issues in KY:
 - Special emphasis on addressing the management of **TENORM** (Technologically Enhanced Naturally Occurring Radioactive Material) generated both in and outside of KY.
 - Group will prepare report to Legislature no later than Dec. 1, 2016







Water Quality Issues





Clean Water Act

- Waters of the U.S. proposed EPA regulation is currently stayed. U.S. Sixth Circuit briefs are due Feb. 17, 2017.
- KY sent final KY water quality regulations to EPA on May 5, 2016 for review and approval (includes the KY specific selenium criteria).
 Waiting for final EPA determination. Next triennial review in 2018.
- EPA **proposed NPDES regulations May 18, 2016** Comments were submitted July 18, 2016. KY is hopeful that the proposal by EPA to object to expired permits will not proceed.
- KY received letter on March 30, 2016 from EPA resolving a 2010 NPDES Withdrawal Petition, including how to deal with AML & Bond Forfeiture NPDES permitting issues
- KY received letter on June 23, 2016 from EPA resolving 42 USEPA permit objections that had been pending since 2010-2012








Public Water Systems Perform Better





Drinking Water – keeping the Lead out



- 409 Public Water Supply Systems in Kentucky
- Over last four years:
 - >77% of samples less than
 detection, ~ 94% less than 5
 ppb of Lead
 - <1% of samples greater than15 ppb action level
 - 3 systems had corrective action, back in compliance
 - March 14, 2016, established proactive workgroup to further strengthen program
